A drive through the Illinois countryside will be boring to some. But to those who understand the importance of agriculture to the world's existence, and for those of us who like to eat, it can be fascinating. Thousands of acres of the most beautiful crops in all of the land! Millions of people enjoy the benefit of the hard work of corn and soybean farmers in the Land of Lincoln. But did you know that the soil in our state is unique? It is among the most fertile and productive in our country.

Why is the dirt in Illinois so fertile? Geologists tell us that ancient glaciers settled over central Illinois and ground up rock and soil in its path. As the glaciers flattened the land, they deposited sand, gravel, dirt, and rocks of various types, adding various valuable nutrients. In addition, the rivers of Illinois and their seasonal flooding affect soil and agriculture. In the flat prairies, water may stand for months after heavy rains. Illinois also has rich soil because centuries of decomposing prairie plants enriched the land they grew on. All of this results in some of the most fertile soil in the country.

The richness and productivity of the farm soil pales in comparison to the fertility of the spiritual soil in our great state! Those who invest themselves in the harvesting of souls in Illinois have come to a distinct conclusion: Illinois is an extremely ripe harvest field!



Jesus utilizes agriculture to teach us about modern ministry. In the "Parable of the Sower" (perhaps "Parable of the Soil" would be more appropriate), Jesus discusses 4 types of soil: hard soil, rocky soil, thorny soil and fertile soil. You can read the story in Matthew 13, Mark 4 or Luke 8. We are compelled to consider the spiritual harvest of Illinois as it relates to this story.

It's true, Illinois presents some significant challenges in ministry. The hearts of many are hardened by sin and the Word of God is quickly ignored. Rocky soil is common - where people live shallow lives, and the Word cannot take root. Thorny soil is also prevalent; folks have so many cares that the Gospel gets choked out. Residents of Illinois can identify with these soil analogies.

But, there is very fertile soil in Illinois! Like our corn and soybean fields, many areas of our state are rich in the spiritual nutrients that allow for a bumper crop, where an unusually rich harvest is available.

Here is what is needed in Illinois:

- People who are willing to "get their hands dirty" in the soil of Illinois. It is hard work, but the diligent farmer enjoys an abundant crop!
- People who will plant and people who will water, so that God can bring the increase (I Corinthians 3:6)
- People who will break up fallow ground. "Sow for yourselves righteousness; reap in mercy; break up your fallow ground, for it is time to seek the Lord, till He comes and rains righteousness on you." (Hosea 10:12)
- People who will see Illinois for what it is: a rich, bountiful state with an amazing harvest that is ready to be reaped!
